

Hihi Green Valley students! You probably wonder what the tribune members are dressing up as (actually who asked this?)* So I'm gonna tell you a little bit about my costume!


I'm sure a lot of you read the book The Bad Case Of The Stripes by David Shannon, and i will be going as the main character for Halloween!
